In 1995, the Alliance for Education (The Alliance) was created to ensure Seattle Public Schools (SPS) would have the community support necessary to thrive. 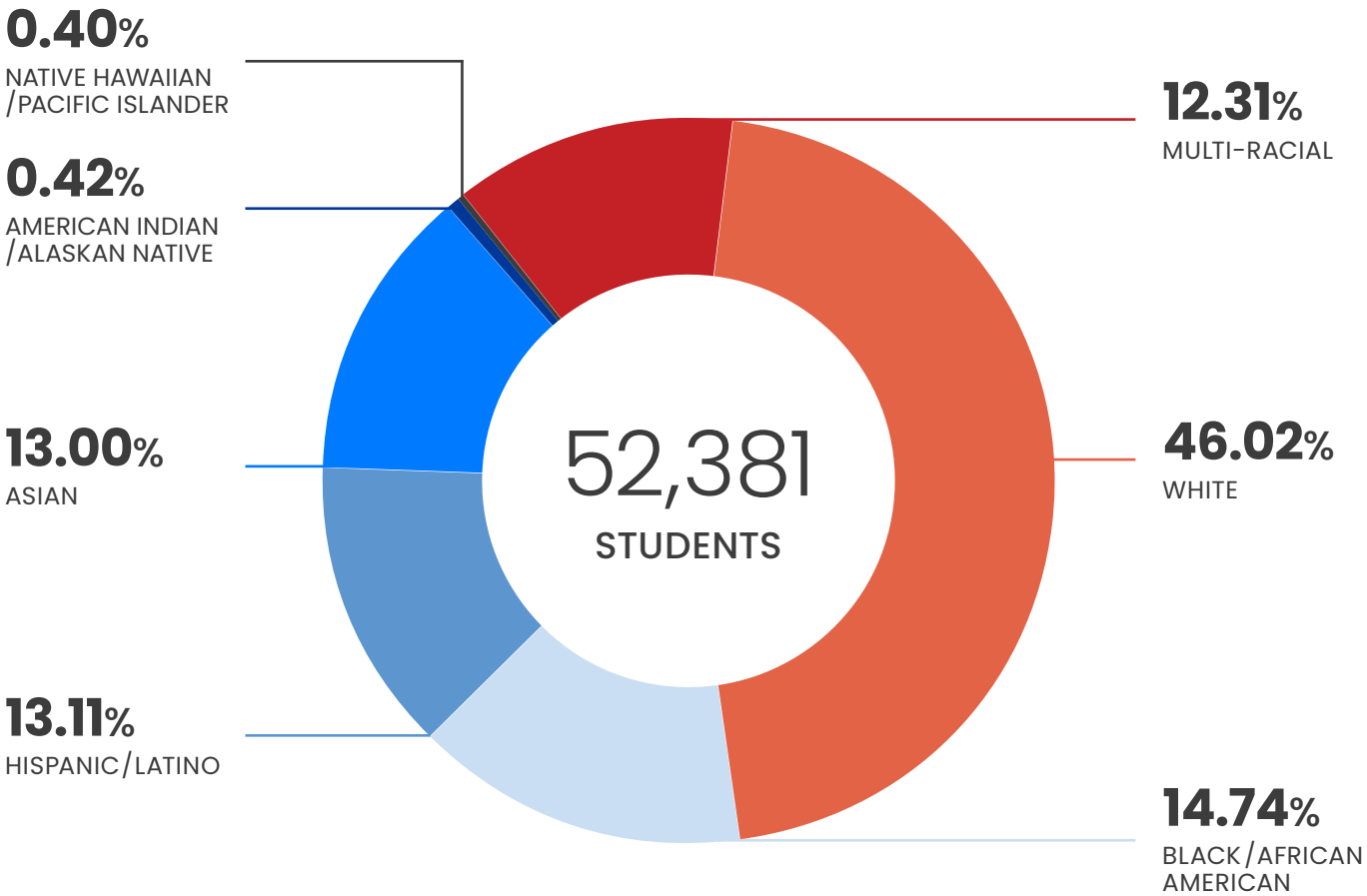

The Alliance for Education is the only local education foundation to proudly serve all **106 schools** in the Seattle Public Schools district. Approximately 52,000 students are currently enrolled within the district and more than half identify as people of color.

OUR PROGRAMS

Seattle Teacher Residency

Research suggests that educator training and diversity have a direct positive impact on all students. The Seattle Teacher Residency (STR) program was **developed in partnership with the University of Washington, Seattle Education Association, and SPS** in order to recruit, diversify, prepare, and retain an excellent pipeline of teachers for Seattle's Title I schools, which are most impacted by the effects of poverty.

The program trains educators to teach in culturally and linguistically diverse communities and places highly-qualified teachers in Title I schools to help students thrive.

STR participants receive a Masters degree in teaching from the University of Washington, and upon graduation, commit to working for five years in Seattle's Title I schools. Residency graduates reflect the rich diversity of the Seattle students they teach with **more than 50% of STR graduates identifying as people of color**. STR graduates make up one third of all SPS Title I elementary school hires, allowing for approximately **3,950 students to learn with STR educators daily**.

STR aims to prepare teachers to be the catalysts in our Seattle schools with values centered on social justice and closing opportunity gaps for students. The program gave me the opportunity to see greater purpose in the work I've done and equipped me with the tools to seek equity and advocate for my students."

Like many of my STR peers, my classroom aims to engage in restorative practices for students to feel part of our community when factors outside of school can be too heavy. My classroom walls reflect the identity of my students and who they will become. Each curriculum is analyzed and adjusted to meet the different learning modalities of my students. Social justice is present in my classroom, opportunity gaps can be closed in my classroom, and relationships are built and solidified in my classroom," said Karl.

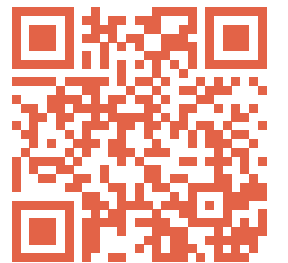
Growing up as a Filipino student

and English Language Learner in Seattle Public Schools, Karl Gapuz understands firsthand the obstacles and assets of being a person of color within the school system. Throughout high school and college, Karl volunteered as a reading tutor at Title I schools across Seattle in hopes of helping others like him and to get a closer look at the systemic barriers that he planned to challenge.

Karl went on to join the Seattle Teacher Residency program where he learned to advocate for and recognize the needs of his students. Six years later, he is still in the classroom, serving as a fifth grade teacher at Seattle's Rising Star Elementary. He takes an empathetic educator approach and leverages his experiences to build connections with his students in order to have them engage in learning.

The STR program ignites a deeper purpose for teachers like Karl, giving them the tools to ensure Seattle Public Schools is a culturally responsive and high-performing system where all students can succeed. With the support of philanthropic investments, the STR program prepares diverse cohorts of highly qualified and effectively trained teachers to break down systemic barriers to education and unlock new doors of opportunity for their students.

OUR INVESTMENTS

Right Now Needs Fund

When students’ basic needs are not met, children cannot learn. An effective education system that advances academic success requires strategies that go beyond the classroom to address overall well-being, including ensuring access to supports that address basic needs like warm clothing, meals, and housing. The Right Now Needs Fund was created to provide these supports for Seattle students. Launched in 2018 with a **\$2 million, two-year contribution from Amazon**, the Right Now Needs Fund was designed to support the basic needs of students affected by poverty in Seattle Public Schools. Since 2018, Amazon and other partners have invested a total of \$4.8 million in this unique and impactful strategy.

Donations to the Right Now Needs Fund help address the immediate needs of students and families, by enabling them to fully participate in classroom activities. Funds cover the cost of expenses not included in individual school budgets. The fund works at the individual school level to minimize bureaucracy and respond quickly and efficiently to requests for support for warm clothing, food, school supplies, housing, and utilities. To ensure that we equitably meet the immediate needs of students, the Alliance for Education distributes funds to all 106 schools in proportion to the percentage of students in each school receiving free and reduced-cost lunch.



The Right Now Needs Fund removes the stigma of asking for help by serving as a safe and accessible resource that prioritizes the dignity of Seattle students and their families. We ensure that each school has available funds and work directly with school staff to fulfill student needs in real time while respecting the privacy and circumstance of the student.”

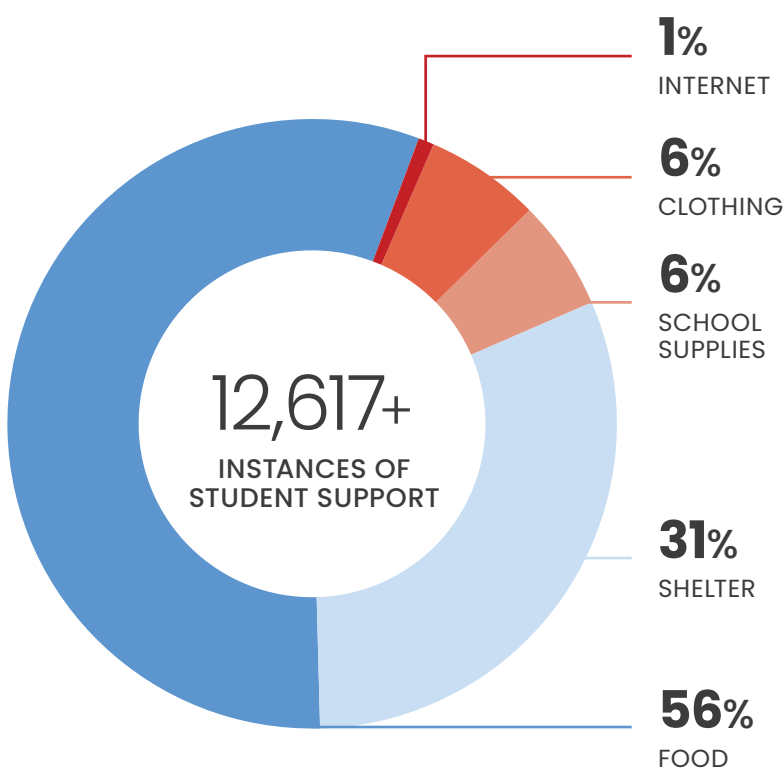
Right Now Needs Fund 2020–2021

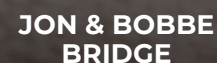

OUR INVESTMENTS

Education Equity Fund

When the pandemic first began, most institutions scrambled to adapt to a new remote lifestyle, and Seattle Public Schools was no exception. At that time, SPS did not provide a computer to every student, and many Seattle students did not have access to laptops or the internet — the basic technology needed to learn. Teachers were required to begin remote instruction immediately with little guidance. Through the Education Equity Fund, the Alliance worked with the district and convened philanthropic donors to offer support to local students and educators during a collective time of crisis.

In addition to gaps in technology and teacher preparation, many families who relied on school meals faced food shortages. The Alliance reached out to the local community for help. With partners like Amazon, Microsoft, the Gates Foundation, and many more, we were able to secure donations of more than 10,000 laptops for students and educators, fund the development of a 24/7 tech helpline for families, provide remote learning training for district educators, and fund 25,000 meals for students and families.

Contributions to the Education Equity Fund address challenges within public education in the long-term and in immediate moments of crisis. We continue to confront systemic inequities by ensuring that all donations to this fund support Seattle students, families, and teachers' access to continuous and equitable learning opportunities.



OUR INVESTMENTS

Office of African American Male Achievement

The Alliance supports SPS in their commitment to actively become an anti-racist educational system to ensure that students furthest away from educational equity can thrive. In 2019, the Alliance for Education partnered with SPS and the philanthropic community to support the launch of the first ever Office of African American Male Achievement (AAMA) in Seattle, with a goal of raising a \$3 million fund to support the Office's first three years. To date, \$2.3 million has been raised in support of AAMA.

AAMA was established to reimagine and build a school system that intentionally cultivates the strength of Black boys and teens, ensuring each and every Black student recognizes their own potential and feels supported in their education. By listening to the expressed concerns of Black male students, AAMA will create a framework that aligns work and practices across the district to ensure SPS has the culture, conditions, staff competencies, and community connections in place for all Black boys and teens to excel in their education.

Seattle Public Schools is the first district in Washington state, and one of only a few across the nation, to create an office that intentionally cultivates the cultural and academic strengths of Black male students while simultaneously addressing their needs. The Alliance continues to invest in this strategic and innovative approach as we work to reach the \$3 million goal in support for this effort.

How Students Become Catalysts for Change in Seattle Public Schools

Meet LeManuel Donaldson, a senior at Rainier Beach High School and member of the Student Leadership Council of the Office of African American Male Achievement (AAMA). In his work on the Student Leadership Council, LeManuel has a seat at the table with district departments and leadership and offers his perspective and guidance to them as they work to make SPS a more welcoming school environment. While most seniors can't wait to start their next chapter, LeManuel is eager to one day return to SPS as a history teacher. LeManuel has experienced the benefit of AAMA advancing Black male achievement in our local public school system and dreams of extending the support his teachers offered him to his future students.

Joining AAMA's Student Leadership Council brought LeManuel's valuable perspective to the district, while at the same time offering him leadership opportunities and community. He joined the Student Leadership Council in hopes of helping fellow Kings behind him. A 4.0 student, LeManuel has excelled in his academics, and his history teacher, Mr. Curtis Reed, ignited his passion to also become an educator. Mr. Reed's care and concern for students left a lasting impact on LeManuel.

Inspired by Mr. Reed, LeManuel sees the value of having Black male teachers across the district and is determined to become part of the solution. He plans to become a history teacher at SPS — but with his own style. As a teacher, he aspires to be a pillar of support for his students by incorporating a fun teaching style that makes learning something students want to do rather than something they have to do. He wants to help students focus their energy on learning the material rather than focusing on just high scores and grades. Supporting AAMA helps ensure that Black boys and teens like LeManuel have supportive systems and essential resources to achieve their goals and thrive.

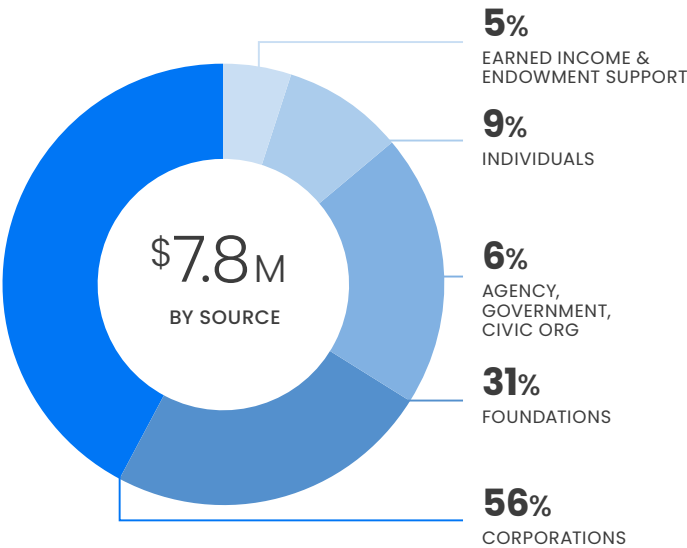
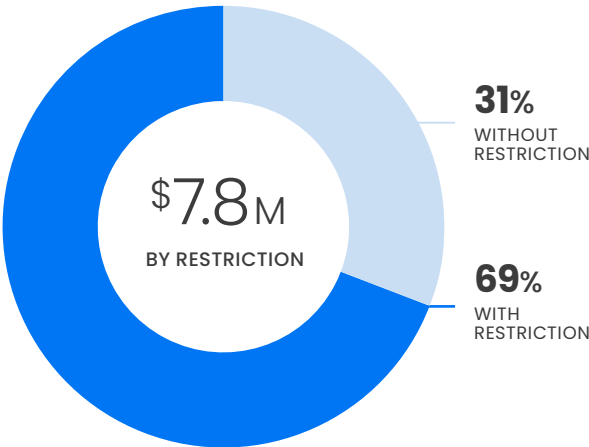

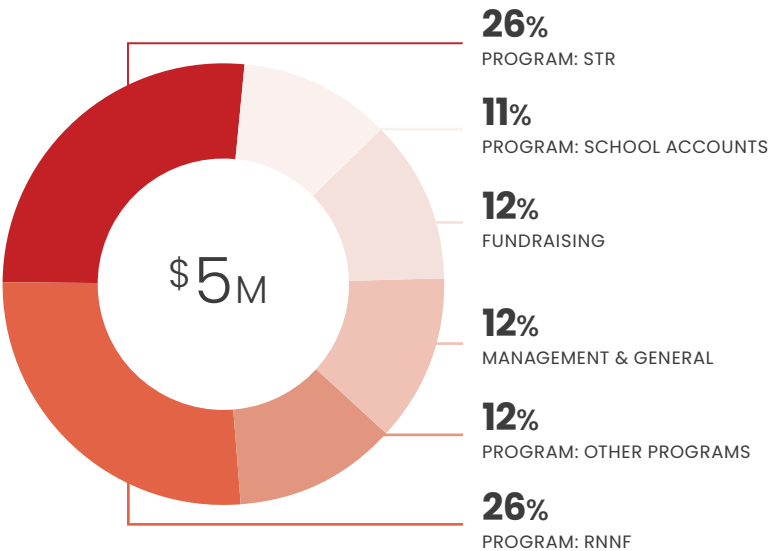
